

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BOA EMBARKS ON NEW ECONOMIC IMPACT STUDY

The Wisconsin Department of Transportation, Bureau of Aeronautics (BOA) has undertaken a new economic impact study for public commercial and general aviation airports, selecting Jviation, a Woolpert Company, to conduct the study. The staff working on the project has completed more than 30 similar studies for other states.

Jviation will collect information and report annual estimated economic impacts for airport management, airport business tenants, average annual capital investment, and general aviation visitor spending. They will report employment, payroll, spending, and total yearly economic activity results.

The data will provide the BOA, airports, aviation stakeholders, elected officials, communities, and others with important information on the economic contributions of each airport and statewide impacts.



The BOA economic impact study staff have completed the initial step in the data collection process. This portion of the process included documenting the results of the first group of surveys from airports, business tenants, and visitors, along with a webinar. The next steps in the study will be to finish collecting data, analyze the direct impacts, and measure airports' annual economic activity.

In late August, the BOA held the first of three planned project webinars for airports to provide information on the study process, products, and schedule and share the preliminary results from the initial surveys. Some of the findings include 1.8 million visitors arriving annually on commercial airline flights and more than 400,000 on general aviation aircraft. Additionally, there were more than 300 business tenants at the studied airports.



We thank the Wisconsin airports for their participation in responding to surveys and inquiries. These timely and thorough responses will give Wisconsin's airports a more robust Economic Impact Study outcome. WisDOT expects the study to be complete in the spring of 2024. →

EAA'S 70TH ANNIVERSARY GATHERING IS A RECORD BREAKER



In September 1953, 21 airplanes and about 150 people gathered for the first Experimental Aircraft Association fly-in convention, at what's now Timmerman Airport in Milwaukee.

Seven decades later, that number of airplanes and people account for about one row of aircraft parking at Wittman Regional Airport in Oshkosh.



The 70th anniversary edition of EAA AirVenture Oshkosh on July 24-30 was a remarkable milestone, not just for longevity. A record-shattering attendance of 677,000 came to Oshkosh, with the loaistics involving coordination between EAA staff and volunteers, Wittman Regional Airport personnel, the FAA, and countless other entities that make it happen.

"We had record-setting

totals of campers, exhibitors, volunteers, and more. It was also a challenging year at times with weather, logistics, and other factors, which makes me even more proud of the efforts by our volunteers and staff to organize an outstanding event," said Jack Pelton, EAA's CEO and Chairman of the Board.

That included expanding Camp Scholler several times during the week, creating camper overflow areas to accommodate all the EAA members and other aviation enthusiasts who came to Oshkosh for what is affectionately known as "aviation's annual family reunion." In all, people from all 50 states and a record-tying 93 other nations came to see more than 3,300 showplanes, participate in more

than 1,400 forums and workshops, and visit the 848 exhibitors (another all-time high).

While the main action took place at Wittman Regional Airport in Oshkosh, which returned as the world's busiest airport for one week with nearly 22,000 aircraft operations over 11 days, airports throughout Wisconsin played a role in AirVenture's success. Appleton International Airport hosted flight experiences by a B-25, B-17, and B-29. Fond du Lac County Airport saw hundreds of airplanes parked at that facility, and airfields from Milwaukee to New Holstein welcomed AirVenture-related traffic.

AirVenture 2023 was also the pinnacle of EAA's yearlong 70th anniversary commemoration as an organization. The original anniversary logo was visible everywhere on the grounds, from the flags over the iconic Brown Arch that led to the flightline to the tail of the vintage Ercoupe that was the grand prize in the annual airplane raffle.

The 70th anniversary logo was itself a part of EAA history. The "EAA" lettering was based on one of the three initial designs for the organization's original logo in 1953 and adapted to fit the anniversary's modern requirements.

The three dozen people who met in January 1953 to form EAA would be hard-pressed to believe what has evolved in the seven decades since that first meeting. EAA now has more than 275,000 members in 100-plus countries and an event that brings the world to Wisconsin every year, making the word "Oshkosh" synonymous with aviation.

Some things remain the same, however: The EAA spirit of "member helping member," the local involvement of EAA chapters, and the efforts to break down barriers to allow more people to participate in aviation. As EAA begins its eighth decade, the size and scope of AirVenture continues to mirror all the elements of the organization that, as EAA founder Paul Poberezny said long ago, is "open to anyone who wants to participate." >

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

Airport Engineer Award:

Terry Donovan, PE

Her uniquely pragmatic problem-solving approach has been most evident in her successful efforts over the years to keep commercial air service at her airport. Lifetime Service Award:

Bob O'Brien

Bob worked in the aviation industry for nearly four decades – for airports and WAMA. He served in leadership roles at various airports throughout Wisconsin, Indiana, Iowa, Illinois, Minnesota, and Georgia. The list of airports is long, including Madison, Green Bay, La Crosse, Platteville, Fort Wayne, IN; Dubuque, IA; Springfield, IL; Brainerd, MN; and Columbus, GA. In 2012, after nine years of running the Chicago Rockford International Airport, Bob was appointed the executive director of WAMA and served in that position until 2020. He also served 20 years in the U.S. military, mostly in the National Guard and Army Reserves.

Blue Light Award:

Dick Knapinski

Dick has promoted aviation for more than thirty years. He has been EAA's director of communications since January 2010, having advanced to that position after serving as a member of EAA's public relations/marketing staff since 1992. His responsibilities include liaising with the media representatives who report on EAA activities throughout the year. Those activities include the annual EAA AirVenture Oshkosh flyin, which has a yearly attendance of more than 600,000 and draws 10,000 airplanes and over 800 international media members to Oshkosh. Before joining the EAA staff, Dick worked for broadcast and print media outlets throughout Wisconsin. He continues to contribute as a writer for newspapers and magazines, and he co-authored the book EAA Oshkosh: The Best Aviation Photography.

Person of the Year Award:

Abe Weber, A.A.E.

Abe, airport director at Appleton International Airport, has served on the WAMA Board of Directors since 2012 and is a past president of the organization. He has been an active leader in the organization's advocacy, leading past efforts to pass sales tax exemptions for aviation parts and labor in Wisconsin. As a WAMA governmental affairs committee member, Abe has shepherded efforts to pass legislation to help the state's airports deal with nuisance wildlife over the past year. He continues to look for opportunities to improve aviation for all Wisconsin airports.



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In 2013, the FAA started the Runway Incursion Mitigation (RIM) Program. The RIM program was launched with the goal of reducing runway incursions by eliminating RIM geometries over the planned 15-20 year improvement program. The first phase was to do a research study that identified and located nonstandard taxiway geometry associated with runway incursions. The next phase of implementing mitigation measures began in 2015.

The FAA defines runway incursions as "any occurrence at an aerodrome involving the incorrect presence of an aircraft, vehicle, or person on the protected area of a surface designated for the landing and takeoff of aircraft." This definition includes wrong runway landings and takeoffs. The FAA developed an inventory of RIM locations from the original study. Inventory updates continue as additional data becomes available. The inventory is based on nonstandard taxiway geometry associated with a high incidence of runway incursions.

These nonstandard taxiway geometries, known as problematic taxiway geometry locations (PTGs), have been categorized into 19 different types. The three types of PTGs associated with the highest number of runway incursions are:

- Short taxi distances from a ramp/apron area to a runway Short distances provide less time for a pilot to complete their preflight checklist. As a result, the pilot may lose situational awareness and taxi through the hold line.
- Direct taxiing access to runways from a ramp area Here, pilots may expect a parallel taxiway prior to the runway.
 This expectation can lead to runway incursions.
- Taxiways intersecting a runway at other than a 90-degree angle Right-angle intersections provide the Pilots with the best view of the runway intersection as they are approaching. The reduction of visibility from other configurations can contribute to runway incursions.

Currently, more than 6,600 geo-located PTGs are in the system. Of those PTGs, 216 have been validated and added to the inventory as RIM locations. Any location where three or more runway incursions occur in a single calendar year, or an average of one or more have occurred in the most recent ten years, will be considered for inclusion in the RIM program. On average, nearly 16 new RIM locations are added to the inventory annually.

In 2015, the FAA began to formally act on the research study results. Through RIM, as of May 2023, 93 locations have been mitigated. These mitigations have eliminated 25 hot spots from airfield configurations at various locations around the country. Some of the mitigation measures are simple procedural updates or airfield marking changes. At other times, the mitigation required is more significant, such as taxiway reconfiguration or threshold relocation. At former RIM locations with at least one year of post-mitigation runway incursion data, the FAA has found a reduction average of 78 percent in runway incursions after mitigation.

Annual summaries released every year since 2018 are available on the FAA's RIM Program web page (www.faa. gov/airports/engineering/incursions_excursions/rim). According to the FAA, the current RIM inventory includes 123 locations, of which 106 are associated with a current capital project, including 18 in construction, 16 in design, and 72 in the planning stage. Seventeen locations are waiting to get underway with the mitigation and planning phase of the program.

According to the FAA's inventory, the Great Lakes Region has eight documented RIM locations, none of which are within Wisconsin. So. how does all of this affect the aviation industries in Wisconsin? There have been an average of 16 runway incursions every year since 2019 (2020 data was not included in this average since traffic levels were impacted by Covid). Although there aren't currently any RIM locations identified on airports in Wisconsin, runway incursions are happening at towered airports across the state at a rate greater than once a month.





While runway incursion data is not monitored as stringently at nontowered airports within the state, they very likely happen there as well. The severity of incursions varies – a serious runway incursion could cause a collision, making it one of the most dangerous events that can happen on an airport. The RIM Program has provided data that can be applied to improve safety at both towered and nontowered airports, even if runway incursions are not being recorded. COLLEGE FLYING COMPETITION LANDED IN OSHKOSH IN 2023

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MAXIMIZING THE AIRPORT TERMINAL PROGRAM FUNDS: A NEW OPPORTUNITY FOR GENERAL AVIATION AIRPORTS



Proactive airport planning, stakeholder engagement, and understanding the federal grant process are a few key elements that helped four SEH general aviation (GA) airport clients secure the Airport Terminal Program (ATP) funding in 2022 and 2023.

Signed into law in November 2021, the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) provides \$20 billion of federal funding over the next five years for airport sponsors to use on projects that are eligible and justified. This includes such facilities as runways, taxiways, safety and sustainability projects, and terminals. Within this law, there are multiple pots of money available, one of which is the Airport Terminal Program. Through the ATP, airport sponsors can apply and compete for a grant from the FAA for up to 95% of the eligible costs of a terminal building.

Typical FAA funding focuses heavily on safety-critical items and airside pavement maintenance, putting funding to replace aging terminal building infrastructure at a lower priority. The ATP funding now provides airports the much-needed opportunity to fund terminal improvements that expand capacity, increase energy efficiency, promote competition, and improve accessibility.

Three of SEH's clients were selected for the <u>first round</u> of <u>ATP funding in 2022*</u>, and one client was selected for 2023 ATP funds. The four communities include Glencoe, Minnesota; Fillmore County, Minnesota; Chamberlain, South Dakota; and Duluth, Minnesota. These airports support recreational, business, corporate, agricultural, and medical aviation purposes in rural and metropolitan areas.

Each year, most of the FAA Airport Improvement Program Entitlement funding for these airports has been focused on pavement maintenance and any needed safety improvements. As a result, the funding often does not reach public buildings such as terminals. Terminal buildings include restrooms, weather stations, pilot planning rooms, waiting/resting areas, and vending opportunities for pilots, passengers, and community members to use while at the airport. Most buildings have not been updated since constructed

in the 1970s or 1980s, and the buildings often do not meet all ADA requirements and are not energy efficient. Receiving funding from the ATP allows these communities to improve this important infrastructure.

From the implementation of their updated Master Plans and Airport Layout Plans, to their Capital Improvement Program planning, these four successful communities were ready to apply for this funding and take advantage of the opportunity at this ideal time.

General Considerations

To apply for an ATP grant, you need to consider several key items, as managing the timeline and expectations can be complicated. Below are a few key items to consider when evaluating if this funding source is appropriate for a terminal project at your airport.

- The project must be shown on an approved Airport Layout Plan, and the project need should be documented in your Master Plan.
- All terminal projects will need an environmental review prior to construction. Typically, a Categorical Exclusion (CatEx) can be used for the environmental review. Field work may be necessary to determine nearby wetland boundaries or to complete an architectural history assessment.
- FAA Buy American requirements (49 U.S.C. § 50101) apply to construction of a new building at an airport.
- To meet ATP grant deliverable timelines, sponsors need a proactive and strategic approach to ensure they can meet the deadlines. This may require the airport sponsor to have a design consultant selected and under contract. For example, in 2023, sponsors were notified of grant awards in late February and were expected to have the project bid by July 1.



Funding Eligibility

Another key element to consider is funding eligibility. It is important for airport sponsors to manage expectations and understand what items within a terminal building are eligible for federal funding and which items are not.

A terminal building at an airport is a public-use facility that passengers may need to occupy as part of their air travel. Minor rehabilitation or remodeling of a terminal building is not eligible for federal funding. However, major rehabilitation (creating an additional useful life of 40 years), replacement and new construction are eligible for FAA funding.

Not all spaces that are often included in a terminal building are eligible for FAA funding. Ineligible costs are tracked separately and must be paid for with sponsor or other non-FAA funding sources. The table below includes examples of items that are eligible and ineligible for FAA funding in a terminal building project.

Coordination with the FAA Program Manager is important when discussing the eligibility of a new terminal building, including the components inside the building. When considering eligibility, ask yourself, "Is the space or item essential for pilots and passengers of the building?"

The next ATP funding cycle begins soon. Keep an eye on the FAA's ATP Website (www.faa.gov/bil/airport-terminals) for the upcoming Notice of Funding Availability (www.federalregister.gov) for FFY 2024, and be sure to take note of funding eligibility requirements. The FAA published the rating criteria in the Notice of Funding Availability, which include:

- Meeting eligibility requirements
- Timeliness of implementation, with priority given to projects that can satisfy all requirements for grant award in FFY 2024
- Favorable consideration for projects that:
 - Increase capacity and passenger access
 - Replace aging infrastructure
 - Achieve compliance with the ADA, including expanding accessibility for persons with disabilities
 - Improve energy efficiency, including upgrading environmental systems, upgrading plant facilities, and achieving Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) accreditation standards
 - Improve airfield safety through terminal relocation
 - Encourage actual and potential competition
